In this capacity, she developed and implemented advanced methodologies for digitization, cataloguing, data conversion, descriptive metadata and archival records' management. Sigal has actively participated in EHRI – the European Holocaust Research Infrastructure since its inception.







DR. ALEXANDER AVRAM

Dr. Alexander Avram is the Director of the Hall of Names at Yad Vashem A philologist with masters degrees from the University of Bucharest, and Hebrew University of Jerusalem, he earned a PhD. in the History of the Jewish People from Bar Ilan University, Israel. Alex has been working at Yad Vashem since 1984. He has been coordinating the Personal and Geographic Names authority lists since 1995, and has been the Director of the Central Database of Shoah Victims' Names since 2000. Alex has participated in many international conferences on names databases and Jewish names and genealogy, and represents Yad Vashem as an expert consultant to various international commissions on Holocaust victims' assets.





DR. SONJA BEGALKE

Dr. Sonja Begalke is an historian and team leader in the field of "Critical Examination" of History" at the Foundation EVZ and Head of Program "Young People Remember". One of her main tasks is the development of funding programs for digital tools and methods for historical learning and Holocaust Education. As part of her doctoral thesis, she researched about the coming to terms with the history of National Socialism in journalism after 1945.





RENÉ BIENERT

René Bienert, M.A., is Head of the Archives at Vienna Wiesenthal Institute for Holocaust-Studies (VWI). He has been at VWI since 2017 and is responsible for further developing the archives and its dissemination. The VWI's archive is comprised of the Simon-Wiesenthal Archive and the Holocaust-related materials from the Archive of the Viennese Jewish Community. Previously, he was a research assistant at the Arolsen Archives and at the Buchenwald Memorial where his work in the fields of research and education was always closely linked to archival issues.





DR. ANDREA DESPOT

Dr. Andrea Despot has been the CEO of the Foundation "Remembrance, Responsibility and Future" (EVZ) since June 2020. A political scientist with a PhD in Eastern Europe, she is an expert on the society and history of the region, on historical-political education, and on the culture(s) of remembrance in Europe and their contribution to European integration. Most recently she served as Director and Executive Board Member of the European Academy Berlin. Andrea also served as a lecturer at the John F. Kennedy Institute of the Free University of Berlin (2009-2015), at the Aleksanteri Institute of the University of Helsinki (2007) and at other educational institutions in Germany and Europe.







Rebecca Dillmeier is a Digital Collections Manager at the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum in the National Institute for Holocaust Documentation. 




MICHAL DROR



Zachary Paul Levine is Director for Archival & Curatorial Affairs in the National Institute for Holocaust Documentation at the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum (USHMM) in Washington, DC, where he oversees all acquisition and archival processing for objects, paper and repository digital records, and time-based media. He trained as a historian of Eastern and Central Europe, specializing in Jewish history, the Cold War and international philanthropy. For over a decade, Levine has curated exhibitions, consulted on strategic and master planning, and guided collecting and project management for museums across North America, and serves as Vice Chair on the Council of American Jewish Museums.







Michael Levy is the Director of the Digital Assets Management and Preservation Division in the National Institute for Holocaust Documentation at the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum. He has provided IT-based services and leadership for over 30 years in a variety of business, nonprofit, and government settings. He has been at the Museum for 15 years where he now leads a team responsible for providing access to the institution's extensive and varied collections catalogs and digitized historical holdings through the Museum's Collections Search, an innovative, user-friendly search, discovery, and access system. The team also oversees programs relating to digitization and digital conversion, and is currently implementing an enterprise digital assets management system (DAMS) and a separate digital preservation system. The Museum's digital holdings now comprise over 90 million unique digital files and over a petabyte of data.







BETTINA MALKA-IGELBUSCH

Bettina Malka-Igelbusch is the Director of the Reference and Information Services Department of the Yad Vashem Archives. She holds a master's degree in Jewish Studies, History, and English Language and Literature from Cologne University in Germany, and the Hebrew University of Jerusalem. In the past, she has worked in project development dedicated to German-Israeli cooperation in civic education, and as executive director of a Jewish Conservative congregation in Northern Jerusalem. Bettina joined Yad Vashem in 2015 as a guide in the Commemoration and Community Relations Department, and started her current position in May 2019.







Dr. Richard Marciano is a professor in the College of Information Studies at the University of Maryland and founder of the Advanced Information Collaborative (AIC). His research interests center on digital curation, enabling technologies for archives, and big data. He is the 2017 recipient of the career Emmett Leahy Award for innovation in records and information management.







Dr. Alessandro Matta is Founder and Director of Association Memoriale Sardo della Shoah (Shoah Memorial in Sardinia) in Cagliari. He is a researcher of the Shoah with a particular specialization in the representation of the Shoah and Nazi crimes in the cinema and mass-media. Alessandro's two principal research topics are: Cinema and Shoah, and antisemitic legislation and the history of the Shoah in and connected to Sardinia between 1938-1945.







Liad Mousan Shemesh graduated in Information Science with emphasis on Digital Humanities at the Information Science department at Bar Ilan University, and holds another M.A. from the department of Jewish Philosophy at Hebrew University. He is currently working as the Research and Public Affairs Coordinator of the Righteous Among the Nations Department at Yad Vashem. He gained experience in system librarianship and in historical archive processing while working at the Leo Baeck Institute Jerusalem and in the National Library of Israel. This followed years of being professionally active in the field of youth work and non-formal education in Israel, Switzerland, and Germany.









Yuval Naor is a reference archivist in the Reference & Information Services, Yad Vashem Archives. He has been an archivist since 2016, mainly researching individual Holocaust victims. He holds a B.A. and M.A. in Jewish History, focusing on The Holocaust.







Zohar Neumann is the Deputy Director of the Archives division in Yad Vashem. She also represents Yad Vashem in the EHRI-3 (European Holocaust Research Infrastructure) project, where she heads a workpackage dealing with Localization and Capacity Building. Prior to joining Yad Vashem, Zohar served a tenure of more than 10 years with the Israel Land Authority governmental agency, and in her last position was Deputy Managing Director of the Jerusalem District. Dr. Reto Speck is the Co-Director of the European Holocaust Research Infrastructure (EHRI), a Senior Researcher at NIOD Institute for War, Holocaust and Genocide Studies, Amsterdam, and a Research Fellow at the Department of Digital Humanities at King's College, London. He is the Scientific Coordinator of the EHRI Preparatory Phase project which is seeking to transform EHRI from a series of projects into a permanent European organization with the mission to advance trans-national Holocaust studies by enabling access to archives, training and digital methods and tools. He is a historian with a research interest at the intersection of historiography, archival theory and digital research infrastructures.

Dprof. Tatjana Tönsmeyer Is a professor for Modern European History. My research focuses on everyday life across Europe during World War II occupation. I have published widely on occupation; among my latest publications (together with Peter Haslinger and Agnes Laba) is: "Coping with Hunger and Shortage under German Occupation in World War II" (Palgrave 2018). Together with a team of specialists from all over Europe, I have put together a source edition "Fighting Hunger, Dealing with Shortage: Everyday Life under Occupation in World War II Europe" (out in 2021), which contains 600 sources from about 20 European languages, translated into English. At the moment we are implanting an online-portal so that these sources can be accessed digitally as well.







Laura Weakly is the Metadata Encoding Specialist at the Center for Digital Research in the Humanities at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. For the past 15 years, Weakly has worked with numerous Digital Humanities teams to ensure that projects adhere to international standards for metadata encoding. For the Nebraska Holocaust survivor portal, she is involved in creating metadata templates and training students in their use.





DR. INGO ZECHNER

Dr. Ingo Zechner is the director of the Ludwig Boltzmann Institute for Digital History (LBIDH) in Vienna and the project coordinator of the EU-funded Horizon 2020 Innovation Action "Visual History of the Holocaust: Rethinking Curation in the Digital Age". He is a philosopher and historian.





PROF. DAVID ZIMMERMAN

Prof. David Zimmerman is professor of military history at the University of Victoria, British Columbia, Canada. He has written a series of articles on the rescue of academic refugees from Germany and Central Europe, the most recent appeared in Yad Vashem Studies in 2018. His book, Ensnared Between Hitler and Stalin: Refugee Scientists in the USSR, will be published in 2021.
